



The Continuation of the Kingdom

The OT and Historical Optimism The Biblical Hope: Part V Psalm 72 Stuart W. Bryan

I. End Times Speculation – An Historic Catalogue

Throughout the history of the Church, Christians have routinely predicted that the return of Christ was nigh. But all these predictions have two things in common: (1) those who made them were ______ of their prediction and (2) they were all ______.

II. Historical Pessimism vs. Historical Optimism

What will the *continuation of Christ's kingdom* look like? What fruit will the Gospel have in the history of the world prior to Christ's return? Do the Scriptures teach us to embrace historical *pessimism* or historical _____?

III. Esse vs. Bene Esse (cf. Gal 1:8-9; Phil 3:15-16)

Sorting out these questions concerning the *continuation of the kingdom* is important. After all, they are part of Scriptural teaching and are necessary for the Church's long-term health. Yet they are not so important that to differ on them is a matter of Christian orthodoxy. We can and should enjoy fellowship and camaraderie with believers who differ from us.

IV. Old Testament Expectation

Does the Word of God promise that all the nations of the earth shall acknowledge the Lordship of Jesus prior to the end of history? In order to answer this question, we must study the way the Word of God describes the nature of Jesus' Messianic Kingdom. What happens to the nations of the earth when God reigns via His Davidic King?

A. Creational Anticipation (Gen 3:15 cf. 1 Jn 3:8b)

"And I will put enmity Between you and the woman, And between your seed and her Seed; He shall bruise your head, And you shall bruise His heel" (Gen 3:15). Jesus would come to conquer the devil and undo the devastation he had brought into the world (1 Jn 3:8).

B. Abrahamic Promise (Gen 12:3 cf. Gal 3:7-8)

The Gospel was first declared to Abraham in these words: "I will bless those who bless you, And I will curse him who curses you; And in you ______ the families of the earth shall be blessed" (Gen 12:3). God called Abraham in order to bless all nations:

"Shall I hide from Abraham what I am doing, since Abraham shall surely become a great and mighty nation, and all the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him? For I have known him, in order that he may command his children and his household after him, that they keep the way of the Lord, to do righteousness and justice, that the Lord may bring to Abraham what He has spoken to him" (Gen 18:17-19). C. Mosaic Wisdom (Dt 4:5-10 cf. Is 2:1-4)

God's law summarizes the justice and righteousness that Abraham was to bring to the nations. "Therefore be careful to observe [these statutes]," Moses declared, "for this is your wisdom and your understanding in the sight of the peoples who will hear these statutes, and say,

'Surely this great nation is a wise and understanding people'" (Dt 4:6). So Isaiah prophesies: ²Now it shall come to pass in the latter days That the mountain of the LORD's house Shall be established on the top of the mountains, And shall be exalted above the hills; And all nations shall flow to it. ³Many people shall come and say, "Come, and let us go up to the mountain of the LORD, To the house of the God of Jacob; He will teach us His ways, And we shall walk in His paths." For out of Zion shall go forth the law, And the word of the LORD from Jerusalem. ⁴He shall judge between the nations, And rebuke many people; They shall beat their swords into plowshares, And their spears into pruning hooks; Nation shall not lift up sword against nation, Neither shall they learn war anymore. (Is 2:1-4)

D. The Dominion of David's Son (Ps 72:1-11 cf. 2:8-9; 22:27; 46:10; 66:4; 102:15)

God promised that through the wisdom and power of His Davidic King, He would reverse the effects of the Fall, bless all the families of the earth, and give the blessings of His Word to all the nations. This is what the psalms repeatedly sing and celebrate. For instance, Psalm 72 sings of the glory of the Messiah's reign:

Petition (v.1) Description of his reign (2-7) Extent of his reign (8-11) Description of his reign (12-16) Extent of his reign (17) Petition (18-19)

As we consider the message of this psalm, note the way in which Jesus' rule is characterized: peace, joy, justice, fruitfulness, prosperity, true worship – all these things come in the wake of His dominion. And how far shall His influence extend? "From sea to sea, from the River to the ends of the earth, ______ nations shall serve Him, ______ nations shall call Him blessed" (8-11).

V. Application

A. My Glory I'll Not Give to Another (Ps 86:8-10; Is 42:5-9)

8 Among the gods there is none like You, O Lord; Nor are there any works like Your works. 9 All nations whom You have made Shall come and worship before You, O Lord, And shall glorify Your name. 10 For You are great, and do wondrous things; You alone are God. (Ps 86:8-10)

B. The End of the World? (Ps 67; Hag 2:6-7)

Magna est veritas et praevalebit! (Wyclif) As Isaiah promises, "He will not fail nor be discouraged, Till He has established justice in the earth; And the coastlands shall wait for His law" (Is 42:4).

For the holy catholic church, here and scattered throughout the world, and for the proclamation of the gospel and the salvation of friend and foe through faith in Christ, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.

For this nation, for our cities and communities, for Northern Idaho, and for the common welfare of us all, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.

For seasonable weather and for the fruitfulness of the earth, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.

For those who labor, for those who own business that are being affected by this virus, for those whose work is difficult or dangerous, and for all who travel, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.

For all those in need, for those who have been put out of work, for the hungry and homeless, for the widowed and orphaned, and for all those in prison, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.

For the sick and dying, especially those suffering with COVID and those health care workers who are ministering to them, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.

For our expectant mothers, our older members susceptible to the coronavirus, and for all those who are suffering with physical illnesses that make them more vulnerable to infection, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.

Finally, for these and for all our needs of body and soul, let us pray to the Lord... Lord of compassion,

in your mercy hear us.


